Tips for Online Learning

- → Don't try to mimic an actual school day- it's not a normal situation
 - ◆ Kids are stressed
 - ◆ Not all are used to online learning
 - ♦ Many kids cannot self-manage their schedule on their own
- → Lessen the workload (it takes longer to complete work online)
 - ◆ Choose 2-4 subjects a day to focus on
 - ◆ Try to keep students off of screens all day (i.e. assigning a story? Don't make them type it out. Have them write it and snap a picture)
 - ◆ Not all students will have strong internet connections
 - ◆ Some households will have multiple kids impacted at different grade levels
- → Teachers: post a short "good morning" video to let the students see you
- → Create a daily checklist of exactly what students should do each day
 - ◆ This helps those that aren't organized
- → DON'T try new tech! Use programs your students are already used to and have installed
- → Use the same method of communication to parents so they know where to expect information from
- → Monitor morale and workload (be responsive to students or parents expressing that the workload is too intense or time-consuming) of students, adjust if necessary

Related Illinois School Code

105 ILCS 5/10-20.56 E-Learning Days

• Districts may provide E-Learning Days.

• Glenbard District 87 E-Learning Plan for ROE (feel free to adapt as necessary, Verified by DuPage ROE)

105 ILCS 5/18-12.5 State Aid Claims During Health Emergencies

• Applies to a school district closes a building or buildings, but not the entire district.

105 ILCS 5/18-12 Dates for Filing State Aid Claims

- ISBE can determine that districts do not need to provide the minimum school term due to health and safety issues.
- "If, prior to providing any instruction, a school district must close one or more but not all school buildings after consultation with a local emergency response agency or due to a condition beyond the control of the school district, then the school district may claim attendance for up to 2 school days based on the average attendance of the 3 school days immediately preceding the closure of the affected school building or, if approved by the State Board of Education, utilize the provisions of an e-learning program for the affected school building as prescribed in Section 10-20.56 of this Code."
- "No exception to the requirement of providing a minimum school term may be approved by the State Superintendent of Education pursuant to this Section unless a school district has first used all emergency days provided for in its regular calendar.
